John (Jay) Rosenbek, Ph.D., is Professor Emeritus, Department of Speech Language and Hearing Sciences, University of Florida; and Adjunct Professor, Michigan State University, East Lansing, Michigan. He has retired from the University of Florida but not from the profession. He continues as a clinical consultant, serves on a variety of advisory boards and as a provider of continuing education in the U.S. and abroad.

In addition, he and his colleagues continue research into the early identification of disease based on speech and language performance. He is a Fellow in the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association and has received several of its awards, including the Honors of the Association Award, the Frank R. Kleffner Clinical Career Award and the Alfred K. Kawana Award for Lifetime Achievement in Publications. He also has received the Honors of the Academy of Neurogenic Communication Disorders and Sciences. He recently completed his 46th year of practice.

Joseph R. Duffy, Ph.D., is a member of the Division of Speech Pathology in the Department of Neurology at the Mayo Clinic and Professor Emeritus in the Mayo College of Medicine. He spends most of his workdays evaluating adults with acquired communication disorders. His research, scholarly, and teaching activities are primarily in the area of acquired neuropathologies of speech and language. He is the author of three editions of the book *Motor Speech Disorders: Substrates, Differential Diagnosis, and Management* and has given many workshops on motor speech disorders nationally and internationally. He serves on the Editorial Board as a reviewer for many professional journals and has served as co-chair and member of the Certification Board of the Academy of Neurologic Communication Disorders and Sciences (ANCDS) and ANCDS Practice Guidelines committees. He is a Fellow in the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) and has been awarded the Honors of ASHA.

Malcolm R. McNeil, Ph.D., is Distinguished Professor and Chair of the Department of Communication Science and Disorders at the University of Pittsburgh as well as Research Scientist at the VA Pittsburgh Healthcare System. He teaches and directs research in neurogenic speech and language disorders. His primary research efforts explore the nature and assessment of the cognitive mechanisms subtending aphasia and the nature, differential diagnosis and treatment of apraxia of speech.
